Vocabulary

This term, our school has been focusing on reading comprehension as one of our site improvement goals. From the work that the teachers have been doing, they have noticed that building vocabulary is an area of development for many of our students. Readers use knowledge about words to help them make sense of what they're reading. The more words a reader knows, the more they are able to comprehend what they are reading or listening to.

How can you help at home?

Talking to and reading to your child are two great ways to build your child's vocabulary. Conversations and questions about interesting words are an easy way to bring new words into their everyday language. When presented with a new word, provide a simple, child-friendly definition and an example that makes sense in their everyday life. Once your child has learnt a new word, try to keep it active in your household.

"Gigantic means really big.
Remember when we saw that gigantic watermelon at the supermarket? Can you think of anything else that's gigantic?"
Mrs Maney shared a great example with me this week, as she was trying to explain to her students what water lapping at the shore meant. She asked her students to imagine the motion of a cat's tongue lapping at milk, which resulted in a great a-ha moment for her Year 3/4s.



How to order on **Book Club**



- Your child will bring home a Book Club catalogue from school
- Discuss with, and help your child pick the books they would like to read





- Order online via the Scholastic Australia LOOP website or app and the school will take
 care of the rest! (LOOP orders are electronically linked to your school in an easy, secure online process)
- The books are delivered to your child's classroom.

LOOP is the easy way for families to order and pay for Book Club.

Log in, or create a new account at scholastic.com.au/loop

- 1. If you are new to Book Club, follow the Wizard to set up your profile
- 2. Click the ORDER tab, and select your school and child's class
- 3. Add your child's first name and last initial (so the school knows who the book is for)
- 4. Enter the product item number shown on the Book Club catalogue
- 5. Make payment via credit card
